12. Francis Pettit Smith of Hythe is commemorated above the High St Post Office for inventing what?
A Screw Propeller (for ships)
13. Torbay of Hythe, 81 High St, has been serving fish and chips since when?
1926. Accept also 1986 as the year it opened at No. 81 High St.
14. The Co-Op was on the corner with which other 'street' before its closure in 1982/3?
Douglas Avenue
15. Which High Street shop has carried the same name on the same site for the longest time? Is it: A. Torbay of Hythe, B. Eldridges or C. Eakins?
B. Eldridges. The name is associated with the current site going back to 1896 despite changes in ownership, although during the period 1939-1947 it may have traded as 'Land and Dove'.
16. The first Sainsbury's store in Hythe is now the premises of which High Street shop?
JC Rook and Son at No 193A High St.
17. Stead and Simpson was the last retailer at No 65 High Street to sell which items that had been continuously sold from the premises since 1893?
Boots and Shoes
18. Before becoming The Hythe Tanning Vault at 47 High Street, the premises housed which business?
HSBC as latterly known. Accept Midland Bank also.

32. Which two celebrities re-opened the RHDR line from New Romney to Dungeness in 1947?
Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy

68. What is Hythe's oldest residential building? **Centuries at No 1 Bartholomew St dating to C13th.**
69. Featuring on 'Classic Cafes' what colour were the Formica style covered seats in the former Four Winds Cafe on West Parade. **Turquoise. Accept also Blue or Green**
70. Samuel Plimsoll who devised the Plimsoll Line for use on ships is buried in which cemetery near Hythe? **St Martin's Cemetery, Cheriton**
71. What type of corn mill is still standing in Hythe? **A watermill, in Mill Road**
72. Where in Hythe will you find an unusual doughnut circular shaped single-storey house built 1874-1878, and what is its name? **Park Road – The Whim**
73. Who in 1035 and the year he died, was King of England and owner of the Westenhanger Estate land? **King Canute or C'nut who died in 1035 (he was succeeded by Harold Harefoot who lived until 1040).**
74. In 1920, Allied Leaders met where, near to Hythe, for a Peace Conference? **Port Lympne (or Belcaire then the home of Phillip Sassoon, MP for Hythe)**
75. And finally, which Folkestone Ice Cream company has continuously provided a service to the Hythe Seafront since 1958? **Rio's**
